Lee Stahelis life as a Pilot is comprised of many adventurous episodes. Most of the ones written here in his book begin with WW11, while he was in the Navy, flying PBYs in the battle against the Japanese in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska. They continue when he joins the Navy Reserves, the U.S. Coast and Geodetic survey, Arctic Pacific Airlines, Alaska Freight Lines, Western Electric, and General Petroleum. He flew for all of these, through the remote Bush Country of Alaska. He spent many years as a Commercial Pilot flying for Wien Airlines in Alaska, and was an instrumental part of everything he did, everywhere he went. His position as a Pilot made him invaluable to the U.S. and Alaska, and to the Eskimo people. His book reflects the close relationship he had with the Eskimo people, and all through those long, severely cold winters, they took care of one another. His strong and honest character follows him everywhere in this book. He later started his own Air Service out of Kiana, Alaska, where he lived with his family of six children until they were grown. Lee flew airplanes for 60 years, before he retired from Wien Alaska Airlines in 1996.

Sea Ice: Physics and Remote Sensing addresses experiences acquired mainly in Canada by researchers in the fields of ice physics and growth history in relation to its polycrystalline structure as well as ice parameters retrieval from remote sensing observations. The volume describes processes operating at the macro- and microscale (e.g., brine entrapment in sea ice, crystallographic texture of ice types, brine drainage mechanisms, etc.). The information is supported by high-quality photographs of ice thin-sections prepared from cores of different ice types, all obtained by leading experts during field experiments in the 1970s through the 1990s, using photographic cameras and scanning microscopy. Many examples are presented with material to support qualitative and quantitative interpretation of the data. Methods developed for revealing microstructural characteristics of sea ice and performing forensic investigations. Data sets on radiative properties and satellite observations of sea ice, its snow cover, and surrounding open water. Methods of retrieval of ice surface features and geophysical parameters from remote sensing observations with a focus on critical issues such as the suitability of different sensors for different tasks and data synergism. Sea Ice: Physics and Remote Sensing is intended for a variety of sea ice audiences interested in different aspects of ice related to physics, geophysics, remote sensing, operational monitoring, mechanics, and cryospheric sciences.
