Astrid Lindgren hat mit ihrer Literatur bis in die Gegenwart Generationen von Kindern geprägt. Das Thema Sterben und Tod durchzieht ihr literarisches Werk. Nicht nur in "Die Brüder Löwenherz", sondern auch in "Ronja Räubertochter" und selbst in den humorigen Büchern über "Pippi" und über "Michel" ist dieses Thema präsent. Not only in "The Brothers Lionheart" but also in "Ronia, the Robber's Daughter" and even in the humorous books about "Pippi" and "Emil" the topics are present. The present volume examines the theological dimension of Astrid Lindgren's work. Astrid Lindgren's texts can be understood as

"christophoric literature", as compatible with the communication of the Gospel. The agnosticism of Astrid Lindgren is characterized as a "religiously open agnosticism in the context of Christianity". By writing from the viewpoint of children, Astrid Lindgren inspires a child oriented church.

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
