Brave New World is a dystopian social science fiction novel by English author Aldous Huxley, written in 1931 and published in 1932. Largely set in a futuristic World State, whose citizens are environmentally engineered into an intelligence-based social hierarchy, the novel anticipates huge scientific advancements in reproductive technology, sleep-learning, psychological manipulation and classical conditioning that are combined to make a dystopian society which is challenged by only a single individual: the story's protagonist. Huxley followed this book with a reassessment in essay form, *Brave New World Revisited* (1958), and with his final novel, *Island* (1962), the utopian counterpart. The novel is often compared to George Orwell's *Nineteen Eighty-Four* (published 1949). In 1999, the Modern Library ranked *Brave New World* at number

5 on its list of the 100 best English-language novels of the 20th century. In 2003, Robert McCrum, writing for *The Observer*, included *Brave New World* chronologically at number 53 in "the top 100 greatest novels of all time", and the novel was listed at number 87 on *The Big Read* survey by the BBC.
