

La Rosa Dai Tredici Petali

Pacifici (born 1931) describes his experiences as a child in 1938-45 in Genoa and Torino under the fascist and Nazi regimes in Italy. Includes references to the racial laws and discrimination and to the German occupation. The appendix (pp. 89-109) contains three testimonies on the anti-Jewish persecution (e.g. in the Ferramonti camp).

Memoirs of a young Jew from Ferrara (Emilia Romagna) of racial persecution, war and terror, then of the affirmation of a Jewish identity, of militance in the Zionist movement and preparation for the departure for Israel and a new life.

Notes that Primo Levi considered the testimonies of survivors of concentration camps, including his own, as incomplete and unable to grasp and transmit the true nature of that experience. In Levi's view, only those who did not survive might have been able to understand and communicate the true dimension of

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what happened. In spite of this, until his suicide in 1987, Levi made an effort to convey his experience to others. Speculates that, before the suicide, Levi lost hope concerning the usefulness of his writing in a context of growing indifference to the Holocaust and Holocaust revisionism.

Kabbalah has always been considered an occult, mystery science and known only to a few initiates. Memoirs of a Jew, born in 1928 in Fiume (now Rijeka, in Croatia), relating her experiences in the Holocaust. From 1938 the family suffered the consequences of the Racial Laws. Weiss's brother immigrated to Eretz Israel in 1939. When Italy entered the war, her father, a Hungarian national, was deported to southern Italy. Her mother took care of the family business until the Nazi occupation in September 1943. Then Weiss, with her mother and two sisters, found refuge in a village in Emilia-Romagna. In April

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1944, together with other Jews, they tried to reach the Swiss border but they were detained by fascist policemen who handed them over to the Nazis. They were interned at the Fossoli di Carpi camp and then deported to Auschwitz. Weiss and an older sister survived until the liberation in January 1945. They returned to Italy and were reunited with their father. In 1948 Weiss immigrated to Israel; her sister followed in 1954, and her father in 1969.

Discusses the development, structure, and functioning of Nazi concentration and extermination camps. Pp. 67-162 describe the various stages Jews passed through from arrest to death in a camp.

Pp. 63-150 deal with the fate of the Jews of Firenze between 1938-44. The historical narration is interwoven with testimonies of members of outstanding Jewish families from Firenze, such as the Cassutos, Varadis, and Cassins.
