Example: "Giant Jurassic Jellyfish Jeopardizes Jamaica" Well, that's not an actual headline, but there's a good chance it got your attention. And that is one of the purposes of alliterations. In poetry, alliterations can be used to create phrasing that flows rhythmically. Most people are familiar with The Raven by Edgar Allan Poe, which starts with this: Once upon a midnight dreary, while I pondered, weak and weary, Over many a quaint and curious volume of forgotten lore, - While I nodded, nearly napping, suddenly there came a tapping, Can you feel the almost musical progression that drives this narrative poem, and quickens the pace? The world of Harry Potter and superhero genre are full of alliterations. Alliterations-like puns-are not universally adored. Although some people see them as a clever form of wordplay, others view alliterations as cheesy attempts at second-rate humor. Like them or not, alliterations are everywhere.
