Le Guin da chi ha partecipato al forum dedicato al suo ricordo, da Raffaella Baccolini a Eleonora Federici, Carlo Pagetti, Salvatore Proietti, a prestigiosi ospiti internazionali come David Ketterer, Joseph McElroy e Tom Moylan. Brian Attebery, riprendendo dalla biologia il modello dei mitocondri, presenta la SF, in particolare quella delle donne, come un “book club”, libri che cooperano scambiando motivi, concetti, omaggi, e che si rendono possibili a vicenda, le revisioni anche modi per dare nuova vita alla memoria di testi e scrittrici (e scrittori) precedenti. E i book club sono molti, dagli Inkling alle reti testuali di autrici che coinvolgono Le Guin, Tiptree, Fowler, Atwood, Russ, Haraway, fino alla scena odierna. Roberta Mori legge il rapporto di Primo Levi con la critica italiana contemporanea, rivelatore sia di inattese consonanze sia di tanti preconcetti: ma davanti al dialogo sovente negato, Levi ne instaura uno con la SF che leggeva. Anche quello tracciato da Alessandro Fambrini per Franz Fühmann, importante voce anche fantascientifica nel dissenso della Germania Est, è un dialogo possibile con figure inglesi e americane come Pohl & Kornbluth e Naomi Mitchison. La conversazione è letteralmente la forma scelta dal compianto Riccardo Valla, in collaborazione con Antonino Fazio, per parlare dell'intrico concettuale costituito da scienza, magia,

religione, fantascienza, fantasy. Scrivendo su J.R.R. Tolkien, Proietti ipotizza una visione giustificata dai riferimenti teorici alla forma intrinsecamente dialogica del folklore, leggendo apertura e incompiutezza come intrinseche alle sue affabulazioni – una strada seguita da una parte della fantasy statunitense d’oggi. Con recensioni di Fazio, Proietti, Giovanni De Matteo e Daniela Guardamagna. Salvatore Proietti insegna Letterature anglo-americane all'Università della Calabria, ed è direttore di Anarres. Fra i suoi lavori più recenti, la cura di Henry David Thoreau, Dizionario portatile di ecologia (Donzelli 2017), e saggi su Samuel R. The Sleeping Beauty in the Woods Charles Perrault
A New Translation by Charles Welsh "Sleeping Beauty" or "The Beauty Sleeping in the Wood" by Charles Perrault, or "Little Briar Rose" by the Brothers Grimm, is a classic fairy tale which involves a beautiful princess, a sleeping enchantment, and a handsome prince. The version collected by the Brothers Grimm was an orally transmitted version of the originally literary tale published by Charles

Perrault in *Histoires ou contes du temps pass* in 1697. This in turn was based on *Sun, Moon, and Talia* by Italian poet Giambattista Basile (published posthumously in 1634), which was in turn based on one or more folk tales. The earliest known version of the story is found in the narrative *Perceforest*, composed between 1330 and 1344 and first printed in 1528.

The folktale of Hansel And Gretel has its origins in stories from various European countries, relating to periods of extreme famine when families were often driven to murder, and even cannibalize, their own offspring in order to survive. As well as featuring such horror staples as an evil witch, a dark forest, and the cooking and devouring of human flesh, it also stands as the blueprint for tales of children in jeopardy. This special ebook collection of texts relating to the Hansel And Gretel legend starts with the definitive Grimms version from 1812, followed by an earlier Italian variant, Giambattista Basile's Nennillo And Nennella (1674). This volume features a variety of essays on writing for children, ranging from studies of classic authors to an analysis of the role of pictures in children's books, to an examination of comics and theatre for the young.

Alfred Lord Tennyson (1809-1892) has often been considered a particularly British writer in part as his official post as Poet Laureate inevitably committed him to a certain amount of patriotic writing. This volume focuses on his impact on the continent, presenting a major scholarly analysis of Tennyson's wider reception in different areas of Europe. It considers reader and critical responses and explores the effect of his poetry upon his contemporaries and later writers, as well as his influence upon illustrators, painters and musicians. The leading international contributors raise questions of translation and publication and of the choices made for this purpose along with the way in which his ideas and style influenced European writing and culture.

Tennyson's reputation in Anglophone countries is now assured, following a decline in the years after his death. This volume enables us to chart the changes in Tennyson's European reputation during the later 19th, 20th and 21st centuries.

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
