With chapters spanning from the UK's accession to the bloc to the aftermath of its decision to leave, the book explores key themes in UK economic growth and EU membership, international trade, foreign direct investment, financial markets and migration. Chapters interrogate the history of the relationship, the depth of foreign direct investment, and responses to the financial crisis. Considering both the history and future of UK and EU relations, the book is a relevant and timely volume that gives welcome context to a fast-changing relationship.

In the European Union, fraud attracts constant media attention and public concern. This book focuses on the fight against fraud, conducted at the European Community level by the European Anti-Fraud Office (OLAF). Emphasis is placed on OLAF's role in strengthening the effectiveness of prevention and the detection of irregularities and fraud, its co-operation with national law enforcement authorities, follow-up of investigations, and sanctions. The book also describes the legal position of individuals subject to OLAF investigations in the light of the existing jurisdiction of the EC courts. It also examines immunities and privileges of the Community officials during internal investigations, the protection of whistleblowers, and witnesses. Finally, the book determines the scope for supervision and judicial review of OLAF decisions.

This research report aims at filling the knowledge gap concerning organized business crime by highlighting one specific phenomenon, that of EU cross-border VAT fraud. It intends to provide insight into: the effectiveness of the present VAT control system; the vulnerability of legitimate trade to criminal inroads; and, the development of organized crime in this area.

This report finds that the funding of the EU is complex and lacks transparency and that there is a need for a simpler system that would reduce the administrative burden. It concludes that a Gross National Income based revenue source is the best way of providing the bulk of the budget's funding. Apart from other considerations, the Committee has seen no evidence that any other new form of taxation would provide the same level of clarity and certainty.

Since Britain applied for membership in 1961, the nature of the relationship between the UK and the EU has been central to economic and political debate, being widely perceived as 'inevitable', because withdrawal from the process would leave Britain isolated and largely powerless.
