Music, Yesterday, Today and TomorrowThe Mistakes of Yesterday, the Hopes of TomorrowThe Story of the Prisonaires

This book is not an encyclopaedia of the British musical in the twentieth century but an examination of its progress as it struggled to find an identity, stepping out of the shadow of its American counterpart. Illustrated with a wealth of contemporary photographs and memorabilia, it examines the contribution of key figures - from Ivor Novello to Lionel Bart - in Adrian Wright's lively and engaging prose.

How the communist revolution failed, presented in a series of catastrophes. The communist project in the twentieth century grew out of utopian desires to oppose oppression and abolish class structures, to give individual lives collective meaning. The attempts to realize these ideals became a series of colossal failures. In Yesterday's Tomorrow, Bini Adamczak examines these catastrophes, proceeding in reverse chronological order from 1939 to 1917: the Hitler-Stalin Pact, the Great Terror of 1937, the failure of the European Left to prevent National Socialism, Stalin's rise to power, and the bloody rebellion at Kronstadt. In the process, she seeks a future that never happened.

"Tomorrow Will Be Yesterday: The Story of BASH" (ISBN 1463660847), a novel by Michael Krikorian, mixes humor, romance and fictional biography to tell the story of BASH, a once-great rock and roll band that, unbeknownst initially to three of the four members, is planning a reunion. BASH went from obscure nobodies to platinum-selling megastars in the mid-1980's. However, what made this quite unusual is the fact that the band broke up in 1979! As the story begins in the current times, the original members are peacefully living out their later years until one of them gets the bright idea to put the band back together. Mixing historical accounts of the band with the mishaps along the way to the reunion (A funny thing happened on the way to the reunion...), the novel traces the lives of each of the members even as one begins a romance for the ages. With a prologue by Herman "Ze German" Rarebell of the legendary German rock band Scorpions, this book is aimed at not only music enthusiasts and hopeless romantics but anyone with a dream. "Everyone has a dream. This particular story is written to revive nostalgic fantasies for those who wish to remember when. Music has always been the soundtrack of life," says Krikorian. "Melding rock and roll and romance, it's a story that might as well have been true, since it is a part of most every reality." Further blurring the boundary between myth and reality, Krikorian has released a soundtrack CD to accompany the book, The Best of BASH which includes all of their "hits". Written to engage and entertain with a vast array of surprises around seemingly every corner (More twists and turns than a Chubby Checker concert...), the story of BASH is intended to add a new legend to the storybook world of rock and roll and the fantasy domain of romance. Solipsism indicates an epistemological position that denies the existence of 'others' by asserting that the 'self' is the only thing that can be known to exist. For sophist philosophers, the belief that "we can not know anything, and even if we do so, we cannot communicate it" is central to this theory. However, until now there has been little academic scholarship that has tried to provide answers to the pressing issues raised by solipsism. In Solipsist Ontology: Physical Things and Personal Perceptual Space, Ural aims to redefine solipsism by analyzing and elaborating on traditional philosophical problems, such as empiricism and rationalism, as well as discussing problems of language, communication, and meaning. Ural reveals where solipsism has been previously ignored, pseudo-problems have arisen that disguise the sources of the problems with prejudices that concern the philosophical problems in question. Notably, many current, as well as traditional problems of ontology, epistemology, and language are bound up in discourses of solipsism. Ural argues that discarding solipsism as a philosophical discourse hinders new interpretations of traditional philosophical thought. This book offers a fresh perspective to solipsism by defining it in relation to concepts such as 'physical things,' 'personal perceptual space' and 'identity.' Importantly, Ural proposes that an understanding of 'identity' is not necessary in order to redefine solipsism. By building a logical system that fashions communication and solipsism as interrelated, it is possible to reject 'identity' as a useless concept and thus overcome the classic solipsist dilemma of "we are not able to communicate." This original piece of research is an important and timely contribution to the field of philosophy that will be of great interest to teachers, researchers, and students.
