George P. Pardington, son of a Methodist minister, had the advantage of a classical education (Drew University), earning his doctorate in 1898 from New York University. Early drawn to A.B. Simpson and his "Friday meetings" in New York City, Pardington devoted most of his professional life to teaching at

Simpson's Missionary Training Institute—now Nyack (New York) College. Severely handicapped as the result of a merciless beating at age 10 by his schoolteacher, Pardington did not let physical suffering suppress his victorious spirit or his keen sense of humor. He regaled his students with his wit and motivated them by the warmth of his unwavering devotion to Jesus Christ and the Scriptures. Published posthumously following the author's untimely death in 1915 at age 49, has been in continuous print for nearly three-quarters of a century. The chapters of this book, prepared personally by the author just prior to his death, distill the essence of his classroom teaching.

All that was done to us, what we have done to others, the failures, the ills, the violations of our persons, the brutalities, the perversions of life, rejections, death of loved ones, tragedies, loneliness, abandonment, Jesus paid the penalty for all these sins, and provided the means to handle the tragedies of life. We do not need to deal with these violations and tragedies on our own. Christ is in us to work out our salvation daily (Phil. 2:12-13; Gal. 2:20; 2 Cor. 5:21; Rom. 6:3-6; Ezek. 18:20). Being in Christ, we are new creatures and we are to deal with life now from the biblical perspective. Our problem is not with Satan, not with people, not with the circumstances of life, but our problem lies in our relationship with God. Our focus is to change from a

concern about self, to a concern about God's glory and that is accomplished by our godly responses to others and life in general (Rom. 5:17; Cor. 5:21).

Thus, the answer to healing the soul lies here: loving God by obeying His commands (John 14:21), and dealing with unresolved actions of the past in a spirit of repentance and reconciliation (Matt. 7:5).

In *Theological Territories*, David Bentley Hart, one of America's most eminent contemporary writers on religion, reflects on the state of theology "at the borders" of other fields of discourse, including metaphysics, philosophy of mind, science, the arts, ethics, and biblical hermeneutics. The book advances many of Hart's larger theological projects, developing and deepening numerous dimensions of his previous work. *Theological Territories* constitutes a manifesto regarding the manner in which theology should engage other fields of concern and scholarship. Much confusion exists in the minds of God's people concerning the Trinity of heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Spirit. Some believe that they are three aspects of just one Person. This they illustrate by speaking of the sun as having light, heat and power. Others think that there is only one Person who is God, and that Person is the Lord Jesus, and that no other Person will be seen on the Throne in heaven but the Son. There are others who believe that God is a Person who manifests Himself sometimes as Jesus, and sometimes as the Spirit, and eventually as the Father. Dr. Bickersteth has presented in a wonderful way a multitude of Scripture texts which correct the thinking, and make clear the true nature of the Trinity. In some cases he presents in parallel columns that which is said of each separate Person of the Trinity, so that it may be clearly seen that there are three distinct and definite Persons who are in this holy Trinity, and whom we call the God-head. He finds the truth concerning the Trinity in many passages of the Old Testament, which otherwise would be most difficult to understand. He has carefully presented the various attributes and activities of each Person of the heavenly Trinity, so that the mind will not be confused when reading these passages. Bible students will find a wealth of information and inspiration in this volume, for each Person of the Trinity is presented in clear, unmistakable terms for our hearts' affections. He especially

stresses the fact that the term “God” refers to each Person of the Trinity, and does not always refer to the Father. He shows that the word “Lord” applies to each Person of the Trinity, and not just to the Savior. In many passages where the text does not clearly reveal which Person of the Trinity is under consideration, the author shows without question the answer to this perplexity. We are constantly on the alert for a better knowledge of each of the Persons of the Godhead, so that these revelations will fill the heart with worship, praise and thanksgiving. The added information given us by Dr. Bickersteth in this volume will greatly add to our own efficiency in service, and holiness of living while ministering to others. This book has had that effect in my own heart and life. As you read this marvelous unfolding of the personality of each of these great Three you will be led to worship God as you never did before.
