D-Day - June 6, 1944 - was a pivotal day in human history. Allies could breakout at speed and sweep through France to the German border, not forgetting the role of the home front throughout the campaign. Even today there are many reminders of D-Day that visitors can see on the beaches of Normandy and in the towns, villages and cemeteries inland.
