Telling the story of a beautiful Egyptian princess who fights to defend her people and her throne, Morning Star provides a look into how English in the 19th and early 20th centuries viewed Ancient Egyptians. This book indexes the Pilgrim Hymnal published by Pilgrim Press in 1958 for Congregational churches, one of the earliest American denominations. Functioning for the hymnal as a Bible concordance does for the Bible, it provides information on the entire text of the hymns and responses. The preface explains purpose and usage. An index compares hymn numbers with the Evangelical and Reformed Hymnal. A write-in index enables adaptation to other hymnals. Hymn titles can be identified without turning to the hymnal because of the numerical index provided.

Samuel struggles with not being able to provide for his family, and Julia and the kids confront unpleasant surprises when a busybody neighbor turns against them. Julia's Hope is an endearing story of faith and faithfulness as Emma teaches the Worthams to live fully, give generously, and love unconditionally. She insists that the family grow where they are planted, like the garden they tend, and each member of the family is forever changed by her wisdom.

Just days after the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, Robert Wortham and Willy Hammond head off to fight in the Second World War, leaving their families behind to deal with fears of what their futures hold, but armed with their faith in God and a bold prayer from Robert's girlfriend, Rachel, both families will cling to hope for peace, strength, and a greater understanding of God amidst this cruel conflict.
