design, which seeks to reduce consumption and waste by increasing the meaningfulness of the relationship between user and product, Harold explores how consumer psychology and empathetic design can transform our perception of consumer products from disposable to interconnected. An urgent call for rethinking consumerism, *Things Worth Keeping* shows that by recognizing our responsibility for the things we produce, we can become better stewards of the planet.
